FOR

#### GILMORE S. HAYNIE

We, of the Wells County Bar Association, were shocked to learn of the passing of Gilmore S. Haynie, a member of the Allen County Bar.

Gil was well known to most of the members of the Wells County Bar Association and had been associated as co-counsel and as adversary in litigation and other matters pertaining to the practice of law.

He married Mary Ann Kunkel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William A. Kunkel, who were leading citizens of our community.

At the time of his death he was a member of the law firm of Livingstone,
Dildine, Haynie and Yoder and he had appeared many times in court in our
County and was recognized as one of the leading trial lawyers of Northern
Indiana. He possessed a well-founded knowledge of corporation matters and
his work in the Study Commission over a period of several years, together
with his many activities of a civic nature made him one of Fort Wayne's
Leading citizens.

He was a graduate of Indiana University from which he held a B.S. and L.L.B. Degree. He was a Past President of the Trial Lawyers Section of the Indiana State Bar Association, had served on many boards for civic enterprises such as the Chamber of Commerce, President of Northeastern Indiana Broadcasting Co. (WKJG) and at the time of his death was a member of the Board of Directors of the Fort Wayne Journal-Gazette.

Gil was very active in First Presbyterian Church, Fort Wayne, as a Past President of its Board of Trustees and was involved in many other activities which are well known to attorneys in this area and to the public generally.

The Allen County Bar Association has lost one of its most honored lawyers. Fort Wayne and Allen County has lost an outstanding citizen and we feel a void and disbelief in the passing of one so young who had before him a great future – one to which all lawyers aspire.

He is survived by his wife, Mary Ann, and his sons, Gilmore S. Haynie, Jr. and William K. Haynie.

#### GILMORE S. HAYNIE

This afternoon our Allen County Indiana Bar Association assembles in sadness for the purpose of enabling us to express our profound respect and friendship for the gentleman and the lawyer, Gilmore S. Haynie.

Neither words nor thoughts nor finest tributes can possibly depict the great talents, the inspiring personality, the high character and the grand charm of this colleague we called "Gil".

As husband and father, son and friend, able leader and brilliant lawyer, there were blended within him those superior qualities which made him a truly distinguished man.

He was born June 29, 1918, in Evansville, Indiana, where he attended the public grade schools and Central High School.

At Indiana University he was a member of Phi Gamma Delta, social fraternity, Phi Delta Phi, legal fraternity, Skull and Crescent, Sphinx Club, and the varsity tennis team. He graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Science in 1939 and in 1942 received his L.L.B. Degree from the Indiana University School of Law.

He began the practice of law in the City of Fort Wayne in the year 1942 and was appointed Assistant United States District Attorney for the Northern District of Indiana in the year 1945 and served until 1949 when he was appointed United States District Attorney for the Northern District of Indiana in which capacity he served from 1949 to 1953. He was Special Assistant to the United States Attorney General in 1953. He was a member of the Allen County Indiana Bar Association, the Indiana State Bar Association and the American Bar Association. He was a member of the Law-Science Academy and was a Fellow, American College of Trial Lawyers and was also a

member of the Judicial Study Commission of the State of Indiana to which he was appointed in 1965 by Governor Roger Branigin who also appointed him as a member of the Civil Code Study Commission in 1967. Gil was past president of the Trial Lawyers Section of the Indiana State Bar Association. He was honored by appointment as a member of the Board of Visitors, Indiana University School of Law.

Gil served in the United States Navy from 1942 to 1945 and was commissioned an ensign in Naval Intelligence when he served overseas in 1943. He was executive officer of the Port Director's Office in Hull, England, and assistant Beach Operations Officer during the invasion of Normandy and executive officer of the Port Director's Office. He was separated from the service in September 1945 with the rank of lieutenant senior grade and was lieutenant commander in the Naval Reserve.

He was a member of the Board of Directors of the Peoples
Trust and Savings Company, the Journal-Gazette Company, Newman
Foundry, Inc., and the Fort Wayne Growth Industries, Inc. In the
years 1948 - 1949 he was president and director of the Northeastern
Indiana Broadcasting Company which operated WKJG. For a term he
served on the Board of Directors of the Wildcat Recreation
Association, Inc.

He was an active and loyal member of the First Presbyterian Church and served as president of its Board of Trustees. He was past president of the Fort Wayne Country Club and of Indiana University Alumni Club of Fort Wayne. He was a member of the Quest Club, Caldron Club, American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Fort Wayne Rotary Club, Fort Wayne Chamber of Commerce, Indiana Society of Chicago, the Mad Anthonys and the American Judicature Society.

His generous contributions to his church, his community, to the State of Indiana, and to his country have been manifold.

Gil was a member of Summit City Lodge No. 170 F & A M, the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Valley of Fort Wayne and was a Thirty Second Degree Mason. He was also a member of Mizpah Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. He was a member of the law firm of Livingston, Dildine, Haynie and Yoder.

His loyalty to friends and his love of friendship added a fine richness to his life. He possessed an innate sense of humor and was a rollicking raconteur.

Gilmore S. Haynie possessed legal ability of the highest order. His numerous successes in major trials did not decrease his humility. To know him was to recognize that here was a man of intellect, character, integrity and personal charm. His opponents in trial saw the aggressive, alert, and highly skilled lawyer and honored him for his integrity, his honesty and his superb talents. He had that intuitive ability which enabled him to see clearly the heart of a problem with vision undimmed by diverting circumstances.

Gil had an abiding and intense love for his family and his family revered him. He died during surgery October 10, 1969, in the City of Indianapolis. He was survived by his wife, the former Mary Ann Kunkel of Bluffton, Indiana, two sons, Gilmore S. Haynie, Jr., and William K. Haynie and by his mother Mrs. Gilmore M. Haynie and his brother Kenneth G. Haynie of Evansville, Indiana.

His life was replete with accomplishments and stands as a model for lawyers and fine men. We shall miss his smile, his pipe, his glorious friendship and his marvelous sense of humor.

IN MEMORIAM - GILMORE S. HAYNIE

The distinguished career of one of Indiana's most honorable and respected citizens and one of the legal profession's most dedicated and devoted members has come to an untimely close in the prime years of his professional life. In the passing of Gilmore S. Haynie, his family, his friends and his community have lost a beloved relative, an esteemed associate and a good neighbor who was highly respected and loved for his generous contributions to society. Here was a friendly man, deeply sympathetic in the understanding of problems of those who sought his wise counsel, forthright and conscientious of manner and purpose, gentle in his appreciation of the beliefs of others but determined and steadfast in defending or advocating that in which he believed, faithful and untiring in his work for the improvement of justice under law and generous in his contributions to the betterment of his chosen profession.

To list the many honors accorded Gilmore S. Haynie, to recount the multitude of his activities in all worthy areas of human endeavor, to point to all the facets of human betterment which prospered at his hand, to enumerate the professional, religious, patriotic, humane, educational, fraternal, financial and social groups which are in his debt for his selfless devotion to their cause is an unnecessary exercise—the excellence of his participation in all these areas is clearly demonstrated by a preponderance of the evidence of the products of his labors. No mere catalogue of the events and the achievements of his life can hope to give an adequate impression of this man, nor can such

completely evaluate the magnitude of the loss his passing brings. In his lifetime of unfaltering devotion and loyalty to the highest ideals to which man can aspire, he truly represented his profession, his country and mankind at their best.

Through all his demonstrations of truly useful citizenship, he remained reserved and wholly unobtrusive. He maintained a quiet dignity, never seeking to impose his views or opinions on any person or group. Indeed, his views and opinions were widely sought and earnestly solicited. He was faithful to every trust. His was an unstinted loyalty to truth and honor with an absolute devotion of his best talents and attainments to the support of every cause committed to his trust.

We, as colleagues in his profession and as individuals, mourn the loss of this faithful, learned and honored advocate, whose career was distinguished by strict adherence to all the worthy attributes of a fine lawyer and a gracious gentleman. For one who has shared his life generously across the span of useful years, who has invested liberally in human helpfulness, who served his fellow man unselfishly and well, the sunset could have held nothing of fear. He faced life unafraid. He bettered every worthy enterprise to which he gave of himself. The dignity of his simplicity, the worth of his character, the silent power of his unfailing kindness, the quiet influence of his example which was always worthy of emulation, the genuineness of his humility and forthrightness, the ennobling influence of his presence

and his deep sense of obligation to duty are memories we keep of him.

Gilmore S. Haynie possessed all the fine attributes of an excellent lawyer. He possessed an honesty of purpose, truthfulness of nature, benevolence of aim, a love of justice and detestation of wrong. In the exercise of these native powers, he was courageous, strongwilled, self-confident, cautious but firm. He employed these powers always under a clear and abiding sense of the highest obligations of a trusted counsellor. For him, the highest duty of the advocate was to be loyal to the client and to the cause he had undertaken to maintain or defend. To win the case entrusted to him was his obligation and to this end he spared no effort and rejected no expedient within the bounds of honorable conduct. His theory of advocacy was always consistent with the sound and wholesome administration of justice. To maintain the dignity and honor of the courts and to maintain and guard a high standard of public morality were regarded by him as a sacred service.

With the passing of Gilmore S. Haynie, three immortalities are assured—his own when the Creator called him to add the light of his life to that of eternal morning—another, his life as a humanitarian who loved and served his fellow man and a citizen who accepted and discharged the responsibilities that good citizenship impose—and the other, his career as an excellent lawyer whose exemplification of the highest standards, traditions and ideals of the profession which was honored by his membership, shall continue on in
