
IN MEMORY

OF

WARD E. DILDINE



Our fine friend, Ward E. Dildine, was born April 4, 1907 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and died October 25, 1970 in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

He was educated in the elementary schools of Fort Wayne and graduated from South Side High School, Indiana University and Indiana University School of Law where he received his LLB Degree in June, 1930.

He was admitted to the practice of law in the State of Indiana in the year 1930 and was admitted to the practice in the State of Missouri in the year 1937.

At Indiana University he was a member of Beta Theta Pi,
Social Fraternity, and Phi Delta Phi, Honorary Law Fraternity.
He enjoyed athletics and was a member of the Indiana University
track team.

After graduation, he returned to Fort Wayne and entered the practice of law with William Fruechtenicht, Sr. with whom he practiced during the years 1930 to 1935.

Ward was a Past President and director of the Fort Wayne Y.M.C.A., of the Anthony Wayne Boy Scout Council and the Allen County Crippled Childrens' Society. The Boy Scouts honored him by the award of the highest Scout honor, the Silver Beaver Award. He was a member of Plymouth Congregational Church, the Allen County Indiana Bar Association, the Indiana State Bar Association, American Bar Association and the American Judicature Society. He was a member of the Fort Wayne Rotary Club, the Fort Wayne and Indiana State Chambers of Commerce, the Fort Wayne Country Club, and was a Past President of The Fort Wayne Estate Planning Council. Ward was a member of Summit City

Lodge F & AM, \$170 and a 32° member of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Valley of Fort Wayne and of the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine.

Ward was a fine gentlemen of great personal charm and possessed a loyalty to friends and clients which will be long remembered.

To the practice of law he extended his highest talents. He was a man of high intellect and was devoted to his profession to which he applied himself with industry and integrity. His was an alert, penetrating and incisive mind which enabled him to immediately analyze and understand all the facets and aspects of the most complicated case.

He was, in deed, a complete lawyer and gentleman.

His contributions to church, the Boy Scouts, the Y.M.C.A. and to his community and legal profession were great and varied.

Ward was an enthusiastic traveler and sportsman who enjoyed the motor and the sailboat and thrilled to surfing. He wrote articles about boating which were published in national magazines on boating.

He loved his family. His numerous activities and professional obligations were not permitted to divert him from his dedication to home and to family.

He was a member of the law firm of Campbell, Livingston, Dildine and Teeple and in later years of the firm of Livingston, Dildine, Haynie and Yoder.
