THOMAS G. MOOREHEAD

Thomas Gordon Moorehead passed away in his sleep early Thursday morning, April 21, 1966.

His family will remember him for his great love and devotion, for his undying loyalty and generosity.

His friends will remember him for his grand sense of humor, his personal charm, his integrity, his ability and for the warm graciousness which lived within him and was a part of him.

The lawyers who knew him will remember him for his fine legal ability and his trustworthiness. Tom's oral agreement was never questioned. "His word was good."

Tom was proud of his Canadian birth. He was born October 20, 1880, in Stratford, Ontario, Canada, one of ten children. With his parents, brothers and sisters there existed a keen loyalty and a wonderful closeness. Tom, his wife and son visited them each year and they him.

He was a graduate of grammar school in Palmerston, Ontario, and of high school in Listowel, Ontario. He attended the Detroit College of Law, read law in the office of Craig & Beechler in Detroit and graduated from business college in 1901. He rejoiced in his citizenship in his adopted country.

The year 1911 saw Thomas G. Moorehead a reporter and columnist of the Fort Wayne Journal Gazette where Andrew Nomahan recognized his literate abilities. His column was entitled "Thought for Today" and was published in several newspapers.

He was admitted to the practice of law by the Allen Circuit Court and by the Supreme Court of Indiana in 1917. In the practice of law he became associated with Emmett Royans and later was a partner in the firm of Moorehead & Gordon and its successor firm, Moorehead, Gordon & Moorehead. He was one of the first tenants in the Cooper Building and there his practice ended.

Thomas G. Moorehead was a fifty-year member of the I.O.O.F, a charter member of the Fort Wayne YMCA; He was long a member of the Elks Lodge, Allen County and Indiana State Bar Associations and Trinity Episcopal Church.

Tom, a successful practitioner of the law, was interested in his less fortunate fellow lawyers: his extended concern lighted days of gloom for many.


Many of us thrilled with him in his enthusiasm for and his devotion to his son, Thomas M. Moorehead, of whom he was so justly proud.
